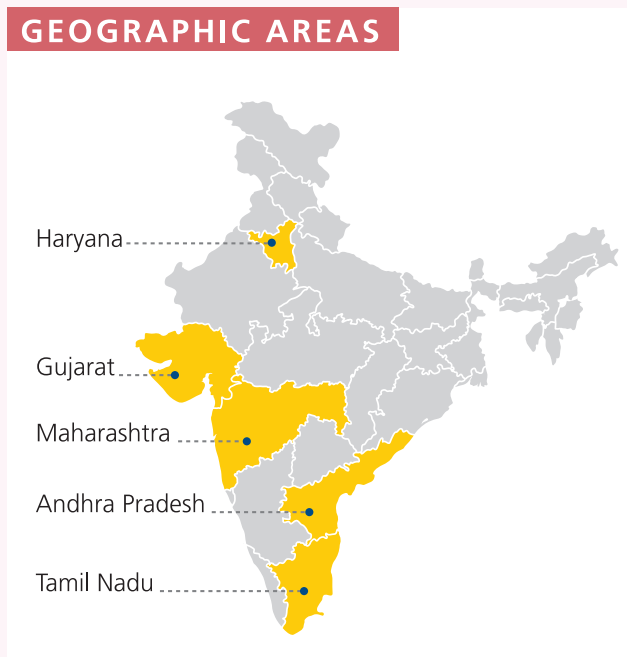

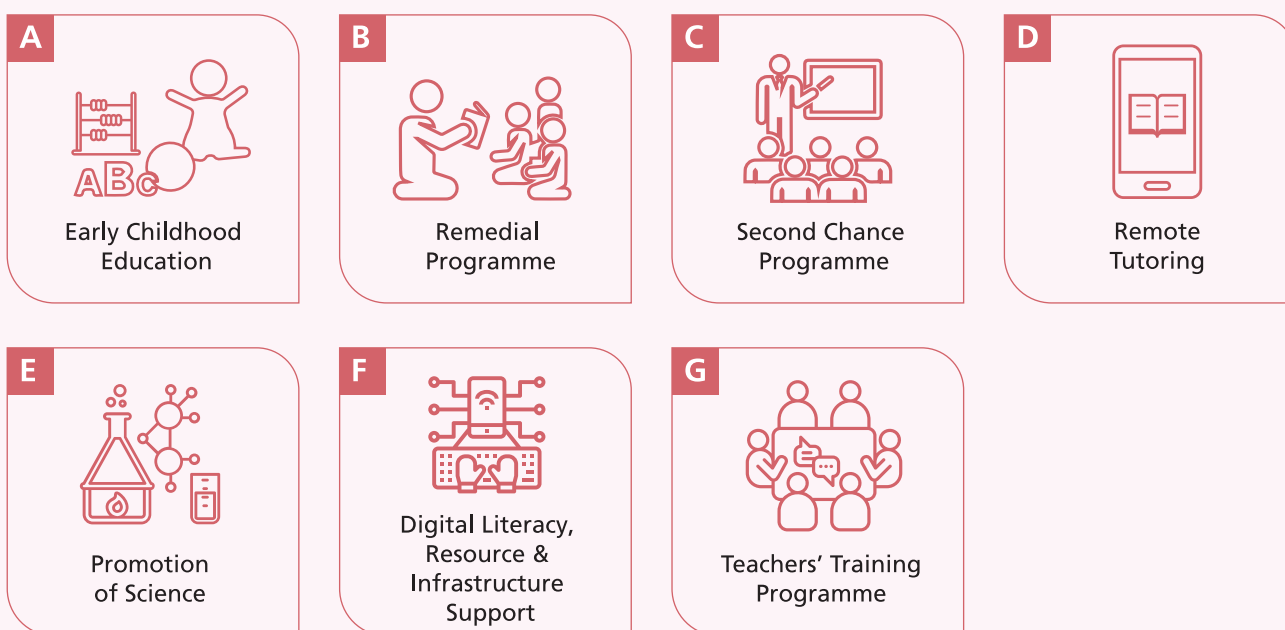

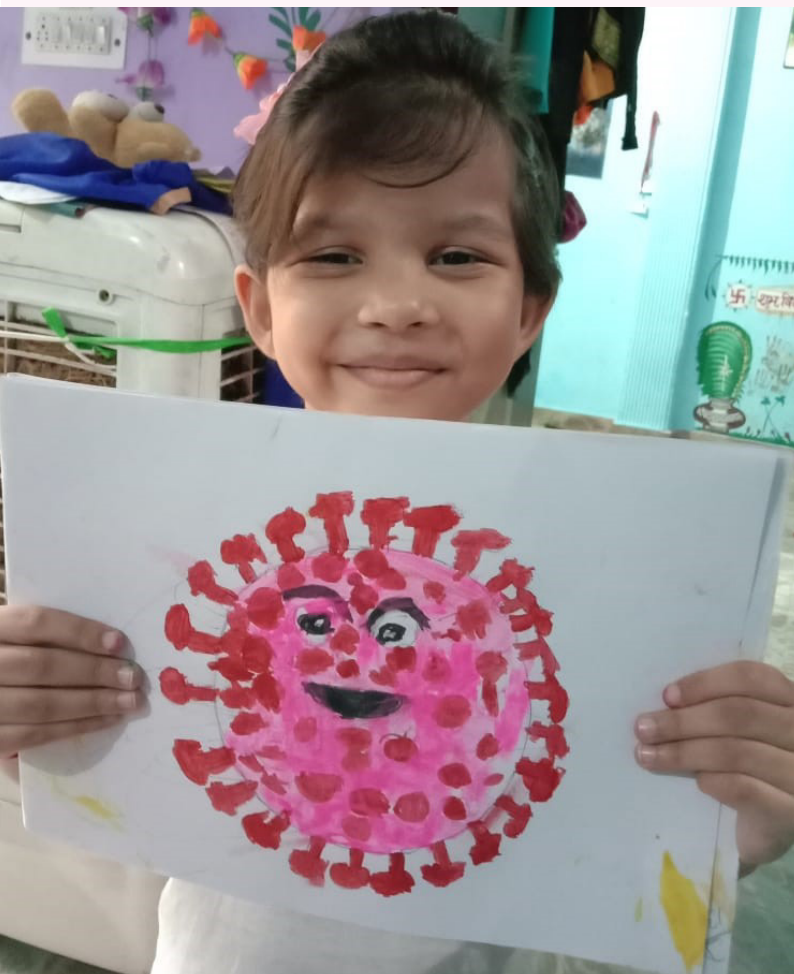

- During the COVID-19 lockdown, the home became the primary source of children's development, necessitating mother's involvement in supporting child's learning.
- The Mother's Group concept, initially introduced in 2017-18 in our Project Vidya's Early Childhood Education initiative for children aged 3 to 5 years in CCD Talasari, was reactivated during pandemic through WhatsApp groups to aid cognitive and foundational development.
- Community Resource Leaders (CRLs) and volunteers played a crucial role in ensuring mothers' active participation in their children's education, especially during the closure of schools.

Remedial Programme

Remedial Programme aimed to improve math and language skills through community engagement during school closures

- Key efforts included strengthening literacy and numeracy in Grades 1-8, promoting self and peer learning and organizing community-based events through volunteers
- Benefitted 3,882 children

- Remote Tutoring Program for tribal students in Talasari has a primary objective of improving English language skills by boosting students' reading levels through cloud telephony. Despite lockdown challenges, the program seamlessly operated with a digital platform at its core.
- Engaging global volunteers in weekly one-hour mobile phone sessions, the program leverages curated content from the Pratham Platform. The overarching aim is to elevate the reading proficiency of 80% of participating students by at least one level higher.

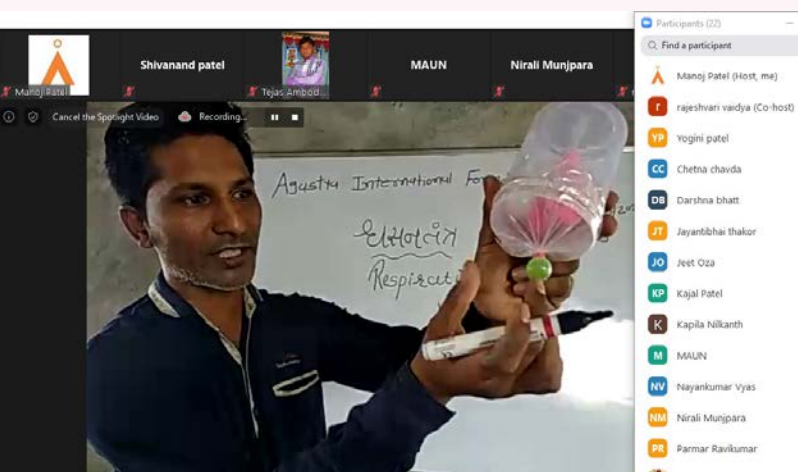
Science On Wheels Programme adapted in April 2020 due to COVID-19, transitioning from online summer camps to Explore Play & Learn (EPL).

EPL emphasized self-learning, encouraged questioning and facilitated expert interaction through WhatsApp and Google Meet.

Specially designed grade-specific EPL modules covered diverse topics, with blended sessions extending until August 2021.

Varied elements, including audio, text, pictures, videos and live online classes, were incorporated for effective student engagement.

The Teacher Training Programme transitioned to an online format for government science and math teachers (grades 6-10) in response to COVID-19 in collaboration with the District Institute of Education Training the program aligning with the NCERT/State syllabus.

Enhancing e-learning through infrastructure upgrades in selected schools to establish smart classrooms. This included the installation of a learning software, ensuring compliance with educational board standards, and meeting feeder school requirements across seven schools in Navsari.

Facilitating uninterrupted learning, pre-loaded pen drives containing comprehensive educational content and worksheets were distributed to schools for grades 1 to 10. These resources, developed by the Government of Gujarat and Maharashtra during lockdown, proved invaluable in supporting students' continuous education.

Pratham Education Society's "Karona: Thodi Masti Thodi Padhai (KTMTTP)" campaign targeted children aged 3 and above, delivering daily Marathi WhatsApp messages with interactive content through out Maharashtra. Students from Talasari were also covered by KTMTTP.

In response to Block Development Officer's request, and with support from local and Govt authorities, the project provided remote academic support to Grade 10 students from Zilla Parishad schools from Talasari.

In July 2020, 313 (91.79%) of the 341 students who appeared for Board exams passed, prompting a request for continued support in June 2021.

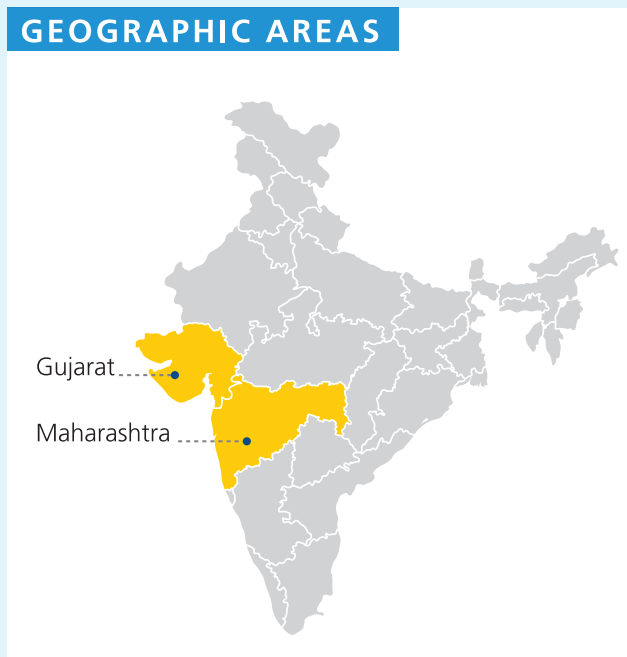

LTPCT employs a two-fold approach in the WASH initiatives, focusing on bringing water to homes through Water Distribution and Supply Systems and implementing Solar-Based Irrigation for second crops.

In collaboration with Gram Oorja Solutions Private Limited Vasa-Kolipada and Kondharpada-Uplat (Talasari Block from Palghar Dist) were chosen as project sites due to the reliability of the water source, quality, and demand from tribal hamlet residents to have water access within 300 meters from their households.

The project involved construction of a new borewell, solar water pump, pipelines, storage tank and distribution of pipeline within 100 meters of each home.

To ensure sustainable water access, geological surveys identified locations for borewells with sufficient water yield.

The entire process was guided by active community involvement, encompassing decision-making, implementation, and subsequent maintenance.



Solar-Based Irrigation for Second Crops

LTPCT and Vrutti collaborated on the "Solar Powered Lift Irrigation System" initiative in Talasari, focusing on second crop irrigation for farmers. This project promotes modern and scientifically validated farming practices, improving productivity and crop quality.

Besides reducing electricity expenses, the solar-powered system contributes to lower carbon emissions, benefiting the natural environment in tribal areas.

The main goal is to increase farmers' income in regions with limited water resources by using sustainable technology, reducing costs, and fostering an eco-friendly approach to farming.

LTPCT expands the successful WASH initiative from Maharashtra to Gujarat, tailored to community needs. Collaborating with the Aga Khan Rural Support Programme in Ahwa Block of Dang District and partnering with BAIF in Vansda Block of Navsari District, the focus is on enhancing water sources and its efficient use.

Interventions include borewell recharge, water pipeline installations, and promoting sustainable practices like drip irrigation and repairs of check dams to support second crop cultivation in the region.

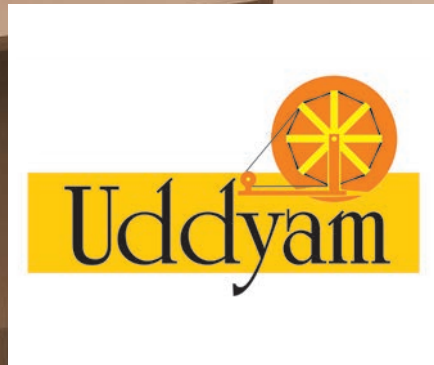

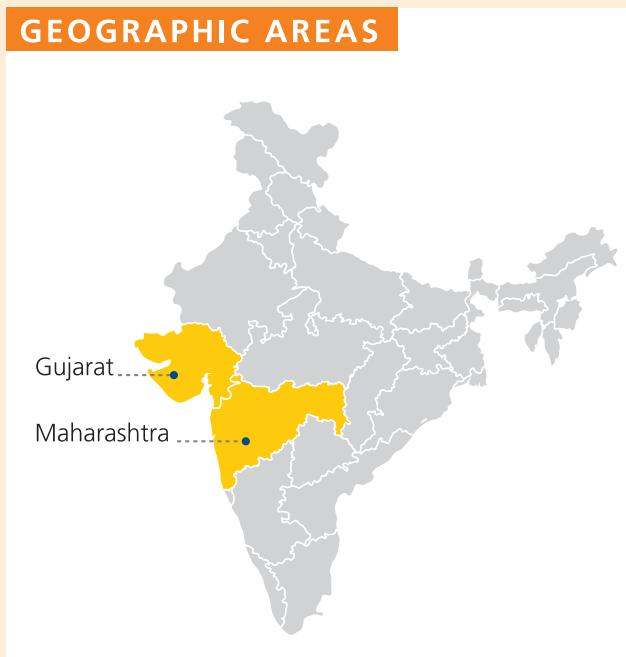

APPROACH

LTPCT remains dedicated to empowering tribal farmers and artisans through targeted livelihood interventions, including skill enhancement and income augmentation programs. Project objectives focus on increasing family incomes, supporting Warli artisans, improving government scheme delivery, and creating knowledge resources for evidence-based policymaking. Leveraging the successful impact numbers from Livelihood Project at Talasari, LTPCT has extended and replicated the same Comprehensive Community Development Project to Navsari Dist (Vansda) & Dang Dist (Ahwa) of South Gujarat on a pilot basis.

Agri-Allied Market Linkages Established 20 procurement centres, connecting 980 farmers with local and large-scale buyers. Procured 242.03 tonnes of Agri-commodities, with sales reaching INR 56.89 lakhs. Collaborated with Big Basket for fair mango prices and initiated a retail project with Warli Painting branding.



Agriculture Extension Training Provided training to 14,041 farmers, covering pest control, input schedules, and crop advisories. Distributed 'Dashparni Ark,' a bio-based pest repellent, resulting in increased yield for demonstration paddy farmers.

Demonstration Farms Promoted 175 demo farms, showcasing new practices in crops like chilli, paddy, marigold, mushroom, watermelon, and vermicompost units.

The Green Initiative Talasari Project promoted sustainable income through fruit sapling plantation. Benefited 1,149 farmers in Talasari and Jawhar blocks, covering 267.15 hectares of land.



Non-farm Based: Promotion of Warli Art

Trained 74 Warli artisans, boosting annual sales. Generated revenue through exhibitions and corporate orders, connecting artisans to broader markets. Secured a significant order from L&T Construction for Warli art worth ₹ 5 lakhs.

LTPCT meticulously aligns its strategies with government initiatives, striving to uplift communities by providing targeted skill-building opportunities, especially for school dropouts and women.

Anil Naik Technical Training Centre - Kharel (ANTTC)



ANTTC, established in 2006 in Kharel and supported by LTPCT and Naik Charitable Trust, is dedicated to empowering school dropouts, unemployed youth, and women through vocational training, skill development and entrepreneurship programs.

A Hands On training on Solar was arranged for trainees of ANTTC and also for selected school students from Navasari under 'Uddyam Saur Prashikshan' programme in collaboration with 'Energy Swaraj Foundation'

Schneider Electric India Foundation (SEIF) partnered with LTPCT to impart vocational training to underprivileged school dropout youths in the field of electricity and Renewable Energy (Solar Energy) sector and assist for consequent gainful employment. Accordingly, SEIF provided assistance in preparation of course training material and setting up of lab

Other than technical, the courses at ANTTC are implemented in collaboration with Orion Edutech, a skill-building partner of NSDC.

The courses offered by Orion Edutech are Self-Employed Tailor Training, Assistant Beauty Therapist and Digital Literacy and Office Assistantship programs supported by L & T Technology Services.

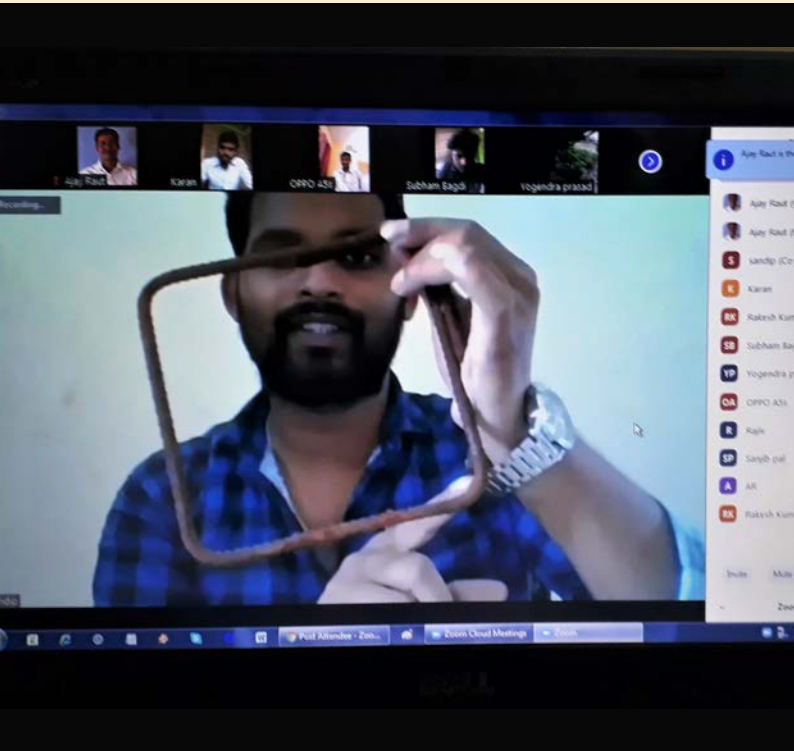

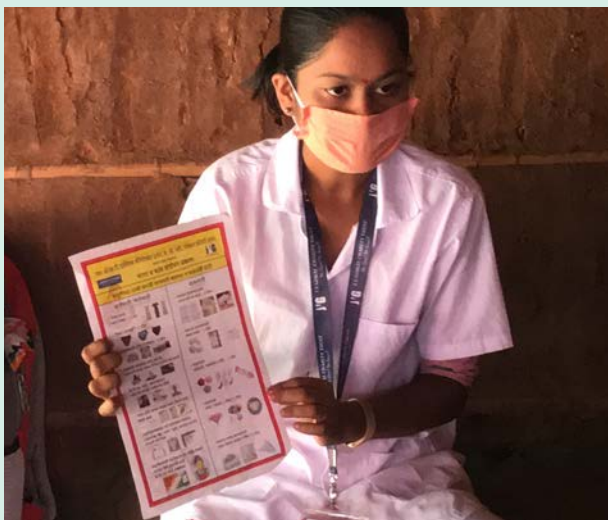
- Primary Health Centres (PHCs) serve as central hubs for health workers, hosting monthly camps focusing on antenatal care (ANC), postnatal care (PNC), and children's health. The emphasis is on health awareness sessions covering breastfeeding, immunity, diet, nutrition, and personal hygiene.



- Sub Centres, managed by Auxiliary Nurse Midwives (ANMs), oversee immunization and record-keeping. They play a crucial role in data collection on ANC/PNC cases and patients with health issues across sub-centres associated with PHC.
- Anganwadi offer nutritional support and pre-schooling activities for children. The Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Project team conducted sessions with women's groups, interacts with ANC and PNC mothers, and provides counselling.
- Community mobilizers noted a positive trend with an increased number of pregnant women seeking ANC services and a higher rate of ANC registration within the first trimester.

Used the CareNX Data App to check immunization status and ensure TT vaccination for ANC mothers.

Conducted 25 awareness sessions during Breastfeeding Week for 408 Antenatal and postnatal mothers, focusing on early initiation, exclusive breastfeeding, demand feeding, and effective breastfeeding signs.

Organized 30 nutrition awareness sessions during Poshan Ahar Week to promote proper nutrition practices.

In response to a request from the district headquarters at Palghar, LTPCT and J V Gokal Charity Trust supported the District Health Officer's office in COVID-19 containment and mitigation activities. This included creating community awareness through information, education, and communication (IEC) activities, as well as identifying and mobilizing COVID-19 patients for diagnosis and treatment to contain and mitigate the pandemic. This provided

LTPCT collaborated with VisionSpring Foundation, J.V. Gokal Charity Trust, and Kotwalwadi Trust to deliver vital eye care services to tribal communities from Neral, Karjat block from Raigad district, Maharashtra. The initiative included Vision Screenings and eyeglasses distribution and referral.

Programs, aiming to bridge healthcare gaps and provide essential eye care to underserved populations.

The effort substantially enhanced access to eyeglasses and vision correction within the community, contributing to improved eye health.

Skill Building in Health: Kotwalwadi Trust

In terms of health skills training initiatives, Kotwalwadi Trust conducted a General Duty Assistant (GDA) program to train rural and tribal women for roles in the healthcare industry. Despite lockdowns, training was conducted online. At the same time, the trained GDAs provided essential medical services through various clinics and hospitals also supporting their families financially, who otherwise were dependant on daily wages and could not move out due to lockdown.



During the COVID-19 pandemic, LTPCT's Health Services, supported by L&T HO-CSR continued operating health centres at all locations by adhering to workplace norms and hospital rules. Dedicated frontline health workers played a crucial role in sustaining these services, aligning programs with national health agendas. The organization maintained rigorous processes for monitoring, evaluation, and due diligence. Additionally, Covid vaccination was offered to all frontline staff.
